

This may have been to achieve as far as the title of the article goes, but the sport is certainly full of characters and much of our time watching TV is devoted to sports. If you're one of those people who have cut down on cable TV and only get Netflix, you'll miss out on big games. In my office, showing up without knowing what happened in a hockey game last night can make one outing pretty quick! Almost as fast as using the word outing. But this app sends notifications to me when someone scores or has a big game. I know what happens as fast as anyone watches TV or listens to the radio. Maybe even faster. Sometimes there is a few seconds delay deliberately put in sporting events in case something unthinkable happens and they should censor the broadcast. Of course, once I showed this app to anyone, they wanted to know if there was something like that for their team or sport. There's probably, just Google it! But it's too easy. Instead, I'm going to consider a bunch of different ways that you can track a great game on Android phones. Mixed martial arts Whether you think it's a decent event, or just a blood sport. Not just the UFC though, which is kind of nice, so you can see who's up-and-coming talent. If that's not enough news for you, you can also use the sidebar menu to access the latest MMA news as it is updated. Of course, you see many other options in the sidebar menu, not least of which is the fighter ratings and stats. I would recommend this app over the official UFC app. Rugby rugby is the ultimate team sport and once people realise they are really interested in following it. There is a position for almost every size and shape of the person in the team, and each member of the team must turn in or they lose. There are no superstars to carry the team - there are no Jordans or Gretzky who can just dominate the game. As the team grows together the wins come easier. Super Rugby Match Centre is no longer available This app is brought to you on FOX TV. It's tasteful and uses an interface with the features I want. Although the immediate update is a bit buried. You have to go to matches and choose one in order to follow the action. Once you do, you see that it's laid out pretty nicely with every significant game reported through the app. You can also view the main drums of these pieces almost in real time. I'm also not sure what value your team selection is right as you log into the app either. It doesn't seem to affect anything. I chose the Brumbies because the first match I watched in Super Rugby was the Brumbies and they won. Irish Rugby No longer available You can find apps to follow almost any rugby league or union that you enjoy. I just chose Irish rugby because, well, look at my last name! I think it's the one. The official IRFU app is largely focused on the national team, but it also brings you information about the club and the provincial league. Part of the MatchDayLive app functions as ticker to keep you informed. Unfortunately, in this case the Irish boys lost. From the creators of the Oilers app, Yinzcam, comes official apps for NFL heavyweights such as 2012's Super Bowl champions Baltimore Ravens. Almost identical in function The app I mentioned earlier is easy to use and comes with the ability to customize push notifications for important game events such as game scores or draft picks. If you are in the stadium you can also watch came with different camera angles. If you don't, they also have a live video feed you can connect to during the game. What Yinzcam does with its apps works for many sports. I think they have a formula that most teams should use, or at least draw ideas from it. Obviously this works as they have developed an official app for 30 professional sports teams. As you can see, the menu offers you several features including results, videos, news, position, video goal of the week, and alerts. The alert feature is an important part here. It functions in much the same way as the Ravens app does, giving you live updates on purpose and playing as text messages. However, with this time app to follow the entire league you can narrow it down to get alerts for just one match, or just for your favorite club. Sport in general is theScore For a true sports fan who wants to keep his finger on the pulse of everything, there are apps that do a good job of letting you know what happens to almost any league and any team. TheScore app is particularly good at this. You can see that professional and college leagues are covered and you can set alerts just like in other applications. Which set this app apart though is an opportunity to create a group of players to follow. It might just be the top 10 in the league, so you can watch the rivalry, or maybe it will be the dream team you chose for the sports pool office. Either way, it's a more intimate way to keep up with your words about what your characters are doing. By subscribing to theScore through the MyScore tab, you can customize your results even more. The app works very well without it though. ESPN ScoreCenter This may well be the only sports app that you need. The thing that impressed me most was the inclusion of a simple tutorial that shows when you first start the app. It's easy to get around, but at least it is. Good thinking, developers! The detail of the app is also very impressive, allowing you to drill down in almost every league and team in the presented types. Again, great design. The news also includes many video clips. This is one of the advantages of being a sports television station, is that you have a lot of video content. But if you really want anything useful from this app you should subscribe to an account with ESPN ESPN You can also log in with your Facebook account. This is not necessarily bad, I simply don't like signing up for things to make them work well.
